HISTORIC PLACES\*

VERMONT MUSEUMS



Vermont has 32 State Forests totaling 86,605 acres, and 32 State Parks totaling 11,288 acres. Recreational facilities in these forests and parks are administered by the Division of Parks.

The Bennington Battle Monument, U. S. 7, in village. Built in 1891 in commemoration of the attack launched from there by General John Stark of the American Colonial Army against troops of General Burgoyne during the Revolutionary War.

Morrisville — Morrisville Historical Museum, Main Street. Brick museum built 1820, restored and furnished by Morrisville Historical Society. Exhibits: 2,000 pitchers, antique wall papers, glass, china, dolls, mementos of first white settlers and local memorabilia.

FEES: Tentsite (with or without platform), \$2 per night minimum; \$1 per night per adult. Campsites: \$2 per night minimum; \$1.50 per night per adult.

Mount Independence, 3 miles off Vt. 22-A. Site of American fortifications built during early stages of the Revolutionary War and drawing its name from the Declaration of Independence.

Brattleboro — Historical Society Museum, Washington St. Early Brattleboro historical papers and items. Guided tours, first Thurs. every month, 3-5 p.m. Free.
