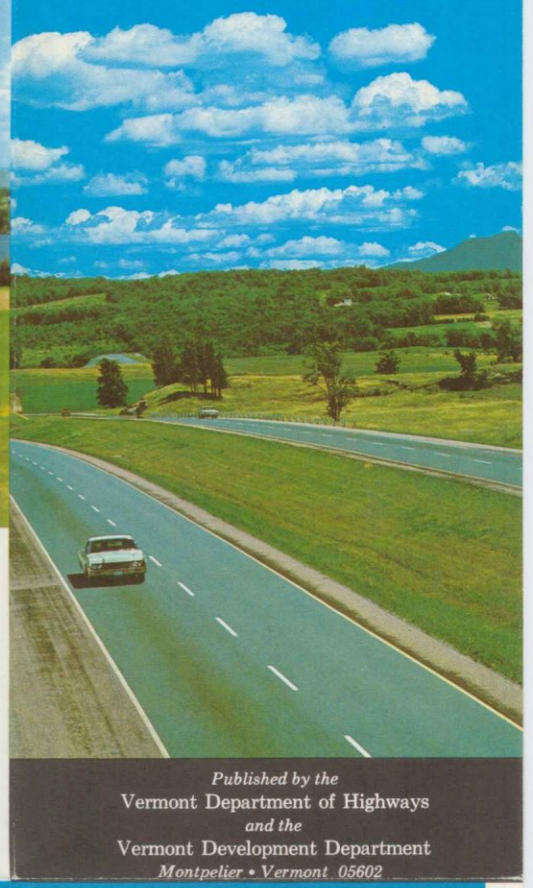

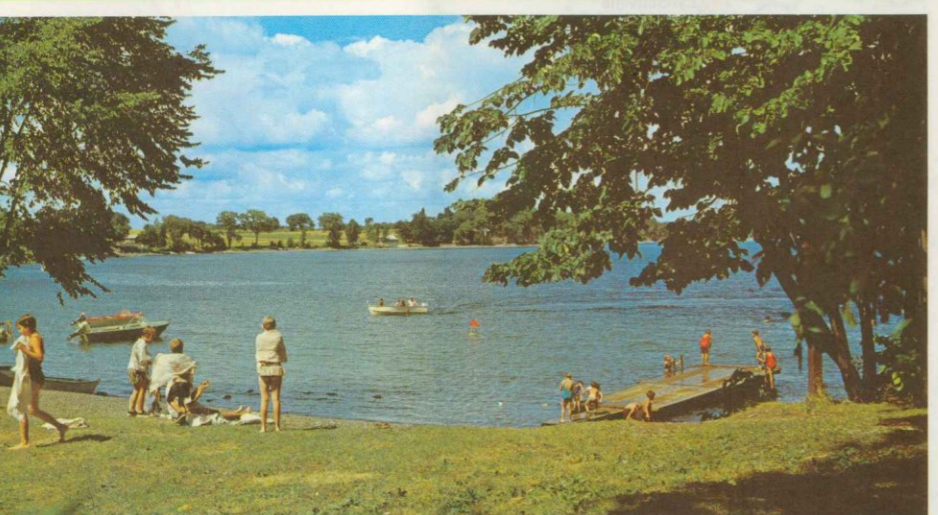

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## STATE PARKS AND FORESTS



Vermont has 32 State Forests totaling 87,343 acres, and 34 State Parks totaling 12,087 acres. Recreational facilities in these forests and parks are administered by the Division of Parks. Some of the largest and most frequently used recreation areas are in the State Forests in contrast to other states where the majority of the outdoor recreation areas are in State Parks. Altogether Vermont has 36 State Campgrounds with approximately 1900 individual sites. There are 13 major State Beaches with public bathhouses approximately 4,000 acres are devoted primarily to skiing and are leased to private operators. The annual visitation is approximately 400,000 camper days, 575,000 skier days and 450,000 swimming and picnicking visits. All forests and parks except game refuges, and where close to human concentrations, are open to hunting.

**CAMPING AND RESERVATIONS**  
All campgrounds operate on a first come — first serve basis, but reservations are available for a minimum period of six nights up to three weeks. Usually reservations are not needed for the period prior to July 1, nor after Labor Day. Requests mailed between January 1 and May 1 should be addressed Department of Forests and Parks, Montpelier, Vt., 05602. After May 1 address Park Manager, c/o desired park or forest.

**GENERAL INFORMATION**  
All summer camps open Friday preceding Memorial Day. Swimming areas close after Labor Day. Areas are open 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. After Labor Day campers have special permit, other areas close 8 p.m. Fuelwood is furnished at most picnic and camping areas. Fires can be built only in fireplaces or designated areas. Trees, plants and flowers cannot be cut, lifted, or picked. Small camping trailers and small house trailers or pickup campers can be parked on most tent sites. Special rules and regulations for utilities are not available. All dogs must have rabies vaccination, and are to be kept on a leash. Owners will be requested to show evidence of valid vaccination. Dogs are not allowed on bathing beaches. All designated recreation areas have resident managers.

**FEES**  
Tent sites (with or without platform), \$3 per night minimum; \$1.50 per night per adult. Lean-to, \$4 per night minimum; \$2 per night per adult.

At both lean-tos and tent sites there is no charge for youths under 18 in a family group. Scouts and similar youth groups are charged the minimum fee, or when more than 5 are in a party, 60¢ each for a tent site, or 80¢ for a lean-to.

**Summer Day Use:** At all developed recreation areas in State Parks and Forests the fee is 25¢ per person 14 years of age or older. Bath-house fee is 10¢ per person and includes locker or basket. Season passes for day use areas are available, \$5 per person.

**Winter Skiing:** Ski lifts are operated by private interests so fees vary from area to area. In some areas there is a 25¢ per car parking fee; in other areas the parking fee is included in the lift ticket cost.

## HISTORIC PLACES\*

**Bennington**  
The Bennington Battle Monument, Vt. 9, in village. Built in 1891 in commemoration of the attack launched there by General John Stark of the American Colonial Army against troops of General Burgoyne during the Revolutionary War. The battle, which took place on August 16, 1777, was fought south of Bennington in what is now New York State. The monument, a 306 ft. stone monolith, is open to the public daily, March 20-Dec. 1. Admission. State owned.

**Burlington**  
General Ethan Allen Burial Place, Colchester Avenue. The mortal remains of Vermont's noted statesman, philosopher, writer, and soldier lie in this cemetery beneath the marble statue. Born 1738 — Died 1789, Battery Park, in city. Scene of abortive British naval attack on American fortifications during War of 1812. Attack took place August 3, 1813.

**East Hubbardton**  
The Hubbardton Battlefield and Museum, 7 miles off U. S. 4. Museum is a building of an 18th century type. Contains an animated electrical relief map and diorama depicting the furious early stages of the battle fought on Vermont soil during the American Revolution, July 7, 1777. Open late May-mid Oct. Admission. State owned.

**Fairfield**  
President Chester A. Arthur Birthplace, off Vt. 36 or 108. The house, an exact replica of the original, was rebuilt and dedicated in 1954 by the Vermont Board of Historic Sites. A 35 acre park and panoramic views of the surrounding countryside make it one of the most scenic spots in this part of Vermont. Open June to September inclusive. State owned.

**Grand Isle**  
The Hyde Log Cabin, U.S. 2. Built in 1783, this structure is considered the oldest log cabin in the U. S. still standing in its original condition. Open July 4-Labor Day, daily, 10:30-5. Donations accepted. State owned.

**Isle La Motte**  
Shrine of St. Anne, on West Shore Rd. Roman Catholic shrine now occupies site of Vermont's first white settlement, Fort St. Anne, built in 1666. Jesuit priests erected first chapel and celebrated first Mass here.

**Killington**  
In 1763 on the summit of Mt. Killington, Rev. Samuel Peters called it christened the Wilderness with the name "Vermont." Most historians give credit to Dr. Thomas Young's letter "to the inhabitants of Vermont," sent to Windsor in 1777.

**Montpelier**  
State House, on State Street. Present structure dedicated in 1859. It is noted for its beautiful Doric exterior, massive granite columns and Corinthian interior. The 14 carat gold leaf dome with the statue of "Ceres", the Greek goddess of agriculture atop, can be seen by visitors entering the Capitol from all directions. Open year 'round; July 1-Labor Day, seven days a week; after Labor Day-June 30, Mon.-Fri. State owned.

**Orwell**  
Mount Independence, 3 miles off Vt. 22-A. Site of American fortifications built during early stages of the Revolutionary War and drawing its name from the Declaration of Independence. Contains the remains of the fort's original foundation together with block-houses, gun emplacements, other defensive batteries and a hospital. Reclamation work in progress. Not yet open to the public in 1967. State owned.

**Plymouth Notch**  
President Coolidge Residence. It was here that Vice-President Calvin Coolidge was administered the oath of office of President of the United States by his father, a Vermont Notary Public, in the early hours of the morning of Aug. 3, 1923. Open late May to mid-October, weekdays and Sundays. Admission. Home-stead is a registered National Historic Landmark. State owned.

**Royalton**  
Joseph Smith Monument, Vt. 14, east of village. Monument marks the birthplace of the great Mormon prophet and leader, born December 23, 1805. The polished granite shaft, standing 38 1/2 feet tall, is considered the world's largest.

**Stratford**  
Justin Smith Morrill Homestead, south of common in village. Historic home of U. S. Senator Morrill, father of Acts establishing Land Grant Colleges. House constructed 1848-51. Registered National Historic Landmark. Open year 'round, Tues.-Sun.

**Stratton Mountain**  
Webster Memorial Ace. Monument marks the site where Daniel Webster addressed a gathering of 15,000 citizens from surrounding towns, during the Presidential Campaign of 1840. State owned.

**Townshend**  
The Scott Covered Bridge over the West River, Vt. 30. The longest single span bridge of its type in the state. Built in 1870. Length, 165 1/2 ft. State owned.

**Whitingham**  
Brigham Young Birthplace, Vt. 81, in village. Granite monument, 14 ft. high, marks birthplace of famous Mormon leader, June 1, 1801. Led Mormons from Illinois to Utah, founded Salt Lake City, 1847.

**Windsor**  
Old Constitution House, U. S. 5, in the town. "The Birthplace of Vermont." In this former tavern, on July 8, 1777, representatives of the New Hampshire Grants adopted the first Constitution of the "Free and Independent State of Vermont." Open daily, June to mid-October. Donations. State owned.

**HUNTING REGULATIONS**  
Deer — Bow & Arrow Season — Begins second Saturday in October 7 a.m. — 6 p.m. D.S.T., for 16 consecutive days (with or without antlers). Regular Season — Begins second Saturday in November 6 a.m. — 5 p.m. E.S.T., for 16 consecutive days; antlers not less than 3" in length.  
\*Only 1 deer per person per calendar year. Must report kill within 48 hours.

**Game Animals**  
Black Bear — Sept. 1-Nov. 30 incl.  
Rabbit — Oct. 1-Last day of Feb. incl.  
Gray Squirrel — Last Sat. in Sept.-last Thurs. before regular deer season.

**Game Birds**  
Partridge — Last Sat. in Sept.-last Thurs. before regular deer season.  
Pheasant — Last Sat. in Sept.-last Thurs. before regular deer season.  
Chukar Turkey — October 1-Oct. 31 incl.  
Wild Turkey — October 1-Oct. 31 incl.

**Fur Bearing Animals**  
Beaver — By trapping: no open season except as fixed by order of the Commissioner of Fish & Game pursuant to 10 V.S.A. §4962.

By shooting — Anytime
