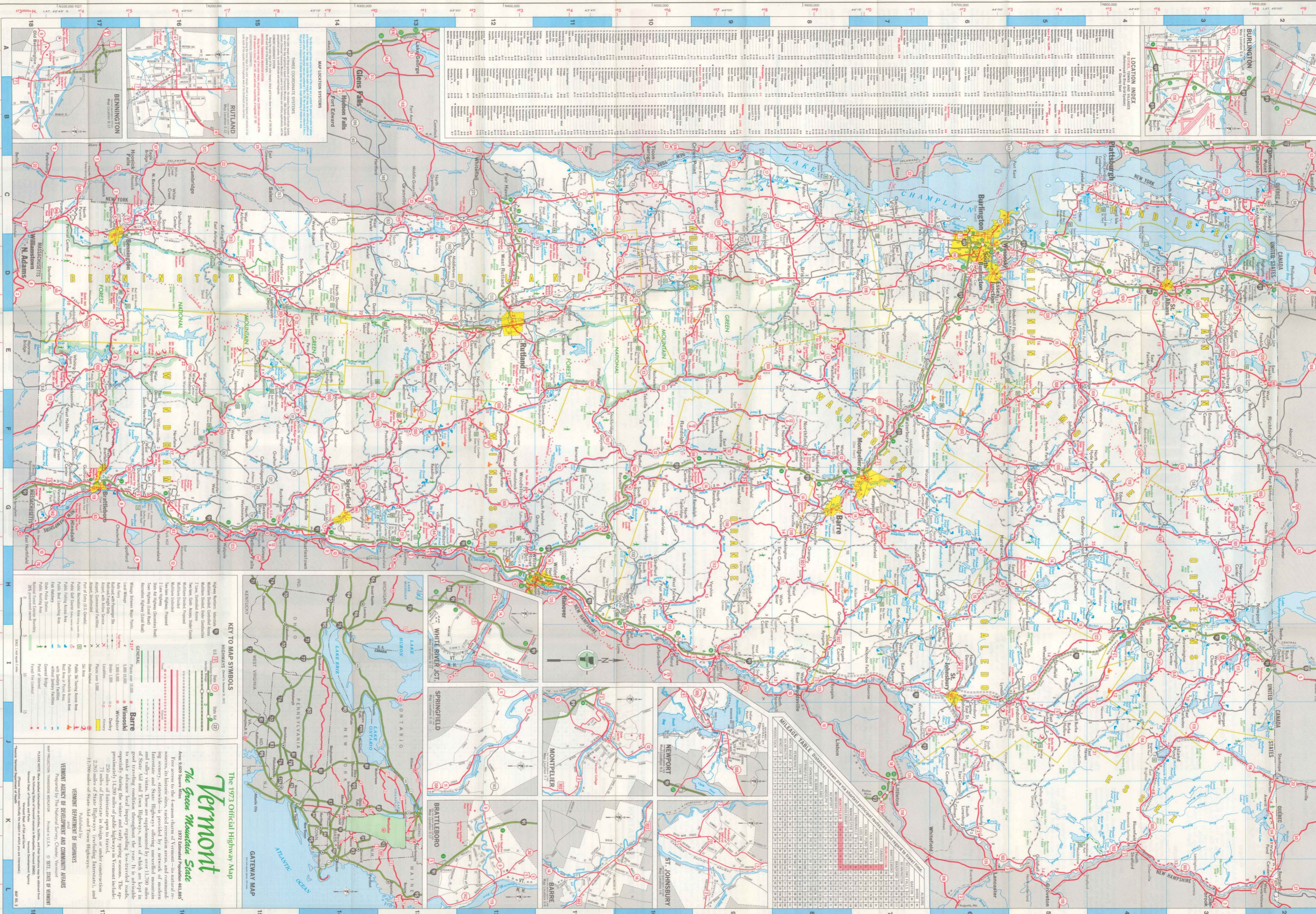
MAP LOCATION SYSTEMS

THREE COORDINATE SYSTEMS

1. STATE COORDINATE SYSTEM
 This system is used for all state maps. It is based on the North American Datum of 1983 (NAD 83). The grid lines are spaced at 1-degree intervals. The letters A through K are used for the north-south direction, and the numbers 1 through 18 are used for the east-west direction.

2. UTM COORDINATE SYSTEM
 This system is used for all federal government maps. It is based on the North American Datum of 1983 (NAD 83). The grid lines are spaced at 600,000-meter intervals. The letters A through K are used for the north-south direction, and the numbers 1 through 18 are used for the east-west direction.

3. UTM COORDINATE SYSTEM
 This system is used for all international maps. It is based on the World Geodetic System of 1984 (WGS 84). The grid lines are spaced at 600,000-meter intervals. The letters A through K are used for the north-south direction, and the numbers 1 through 18 are used for the east-west direction.

Free access to the Adirondack Park of Vermont—the natural recreational state park—stretches across the northern and western parts of the state. High quality recreational areas and scenic views are available throughout the state. These are supplemented by over 11,700 miles of State Aid and Town Highway, most of which are kept in good traveling condition throughout the year. It is advisable to make advance road inquiry regarding less-traveled roads, especially during the winter and early spring seasons. The approximately 1,300 miles of public highways in Vermont include: 2,265 miles of Interstate in design or under construction; 11,700 miles of State Aid and Town Highways; and 11,700 miles of State Aid and Town Highways.

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
