GENERAL LOCATION SYSTEM

Map Location System: This map is divided into a grid of 18 vertical columns and 18 horizontal rows. The columns are labeled with letters A through R, and the rows are labeled with numbers 1 through 18. This system allows you to find any location on the map by its grid coordinates.

Three Coordinate Systems: This map uses three different coordinate systems to show location. The first is the U.S. National Grid, which is the standard grid used on most maps. The second is the Vermont State Grid, which is based on the Vermont State Plane projection. The third is the Vermont State Plane Grid, which is based on the Vermont State Plane projection and is used for most Vermont state government maps.

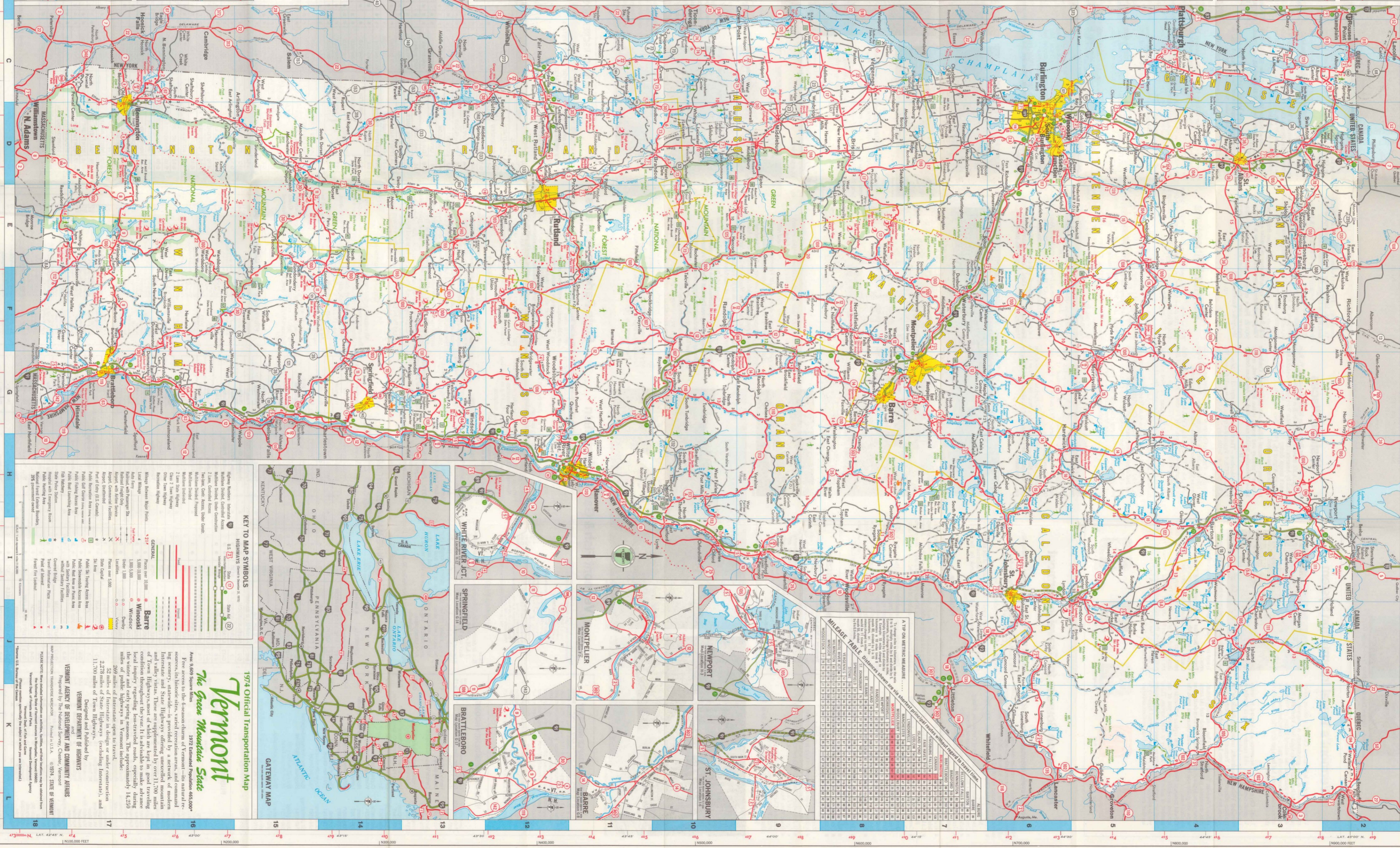

Five access to the best of Vermont—its natural resources, its historic sites, varied recreation areas, and command heights of its hills. Highways are a network of modern roads, many of them scenic, that are supplemented by over 11,700 miles of Town Highway, most of which are kept in good traveling condition throughout the year. It is available to make advance local inquiry regarding best-traveled roads, especially during the winter and early spring seasons. The approximately 14,250 miles of highways in Vermont include:

- 32 miles of Interstate in design or under construction
- 2,270 miles of State Highways (excluding Interstate), and 11,700 miles of Town Highways.

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
