Vermont's Travel Information System

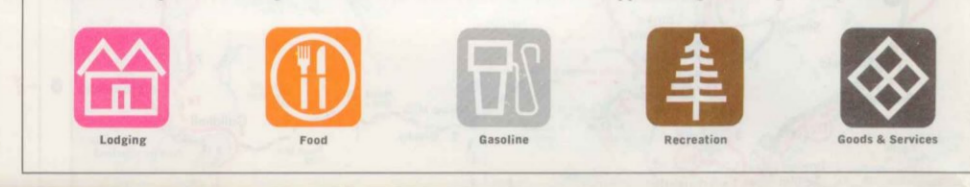

VERMONT'S BEVERAGE CONTAINER DEPOSIT LAW

In 1973, Vermont enacted legislation against throw-away beer and soda containers, primarily as a litter deterrent. The law mandates a minimum 5-cent deposit on every beer and soda can or bottle sold in the state. This legislation has been overwhelmingly successful and roadside litter has been dramatically reduced.

Visitors are urged to cooperate by redeeming these containers or by giving them to a resident to return if time does not permit them to do so. Do not "dispose of property" by placing in a trash container as you would at home—they are "money"! And, of course, please never dispose of them improperly! Thank you.

Historic Places

Bennington — The Bennington Battle Monument, Vt. 9, in village. A 306 ft. stone monolith built in 1891 to commemorate attack by America's General John Stark against General Burgoyne's troops during Revolutionary War. The battle took place on August 16, 1777. Open daily, March 20-Dec. 1. Admission. State owned.

Burlington — General Ethan Allen Burial Place, Colchester Avenue. Cemetery and marble state. Battery Park, in city. Scene of abortive British naval attack on American fortifications, August 3, 1813.

East Hubbardton — The Hubbardton Battlefield and Museum, 7 miles of U.S. 4. Visitor Reception Center and Museum. Site of Revolutionary battle, July 7, 1777. Open late May-mid Oct. State owned.

Fairfield — President Chester A. Arthur Birthplace, off Vt. 36 or 108. Reproduction of original house. 35-acre park. Open June to September inclusive. Admission. State owned.

Grand Isle — The Hyde Log Cabin, U.S. 2. Built in 1783. Oldest log cabin in U.S. Open July 4-Labor Day, daily, 10:30-5. Donations. State owned.

Isle La Motte — Shrine of Ste. Anne, on West Shore Rd. Roman Catholic shrine on site of Vermont's first white settlement. Fort Ste. Anne, built in 1666.

Montpelier — State House, on State Street. Present structure dedicated 1859. Doric exterior, Corinthian interior. 14 carat gold leaf dome. Open year round; July 1-Labor Day, seven days a week; after Labor Day-June 30, Mon.-Fri. State owned.

Plymouth Notch — President Coolidge Homestead. Seven restored buildings including homestead, birthplace, church, store. Open late May to mid-October, weekdays and Sundays. Admission.

Reading — "Indian Stones." Slate markers erected in 1799 to commemorate birth of Elizabeth Johnson, born while her parents were captives of Abnaki Indians. Located near northeast corner of intersection of Vt. Rte. 106 & Knapp Brook.

Royalton — Joseph Smith Monument, Vt. 14, east of village. 38' of polished granite shaft marks birthplace of Mormon prophet and leader.

Springfield — The Eureka Schoolhouse, located on Vt. 11, between Springfield and Exit 7 of Interstate 91. 1785 schoolhouse is oldest in Vermont. Open from late May to mid-October. State owned.

Stratford — Justin Smith Morrill Homestead, south of common in village. Home of father of Acts establishing Land Grant

Vermont Fish & Game Information

License Fees: (All licensees listed below are available from local Town or City Clerk. Non-residents may apply through the mail as well.)

Beginning in 1975, in order to purchase a Vt. hunting or combination license, a person must show a certificate proving he has satisfactorily completed a hunter safety course or he must show a previous hunting or combination license issued to him.

Hunting Regulations

Deer & Arrow Season — Begins second Saturday in October, one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset, for 16 consecutive days (either sex deer may be taken). Special license required.

Regular Season — Begins on a Sat., twelve days before Thanksgiving, one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset, for 16 consecutive days; antlers not less than 3 inches in length. Deer may be taken with either firearm or bow and arrow. Deer must be reported within 48 hours and must be tagged immediately. Tag must remain on deer until it is cut up for consumption.

Fishing Regulations

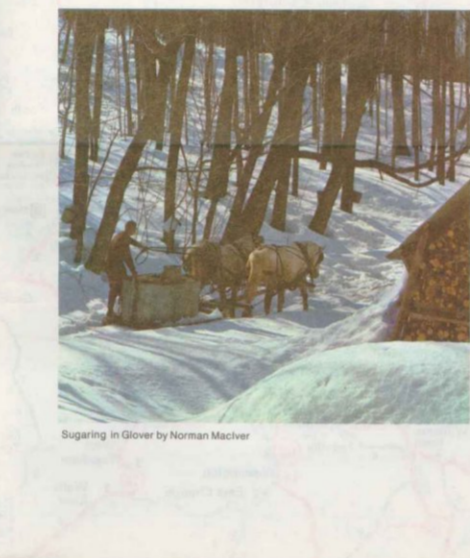
Brook Trout, Brown Trout, Rainbow Trout, Lake Trout, Salmon — Second Sat. in April-Second Sun. in Oct., both dates inclusive.

Northern Pike, Walleyed Pike, Muskellunge, Pickerel — Last Sat. in April-March 15, inclusive.

State Parks and Forests

Vermont has 34 State Forests and 38 State Parks, totaling 130,000 acres. Recreational facilities in both forests and parks are administered by the Division of Parks. The Division operates 37 campgrounds containing approximately 2,200 individual campsites and 13 major state beaches with public bathhouses. Approximately 4,000 acres in the State Forests are devoted primarily to skiing and are leased to private operators. Some of these ski areas, located at least in part on state forest land, are Skowhegan, Killbuck and Okemo. All forests and parks, except game refuges, and where close to human concentrations, are open to hunting after October 15th. Many of the forests and parks have hiking and snowmobile trails.



Camping

All campgrounds have a resident manager, drinking water and flush toilets. An individual campsite includes a level tent space, fireplace and table. All sites will accommodate a tent and most all sites will accommodate a travel trailer, but there are no special hookups for utilities in any of the campgrounds. However, most campgrounds have a sanitary station for use by self-contained camper vehicles. Some of the campgrounds have Green Mountain lean-tos, which are roofed shelters closed on three sides and fully open on the fourth. They have a 10' x 13' wooden floor about 15 inches above the ground and will accommodate up to five persons. General Information

All summer areas open Friday preceding Memorial Day. Swimming areas close after Labor Day. Other areas close after Columbus Day. Day use areas are open 10:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. After Labor Day, the areas close at 8:00 P.M.

Fires can be built only in fireplaces or designated areas. Fuelwood is available in the campgrounds.

Trees, plants and flowers cannot be cut, lifted or picked. All dogs must have rabies vaccination, and owners will be requested to show evidence of valid vaccination. All pets to be kept on leash. All pets prohibited in swimming areas.

Vermont also has 241,000 acres of Great Mountain National Forest land administered by the U.S. Forest Service. For further information, write: Forest Supervisor, Green Mountain National Forest, 151 West St., Rutland, Vt. 05701.
