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## State Craft Centers

The Vermont State Craft Center at Frog Hollow, the nation's first state craft center, was established by Governor's Executive Order in 1975. It is located in the charming college town of Middlebury. The center is open 9:30-5 p.m. Mon.-Sat. from May 1 through early Jan. and 9:30-5 p.m. Tues. Sat. from Feb. 1-April 30. It is closed the last 3 weeks of Jan. An extensive collection of Vermont crafts in all media is offered.

Opened in May, 1976, in the historic town of Windsor is Vermont's second state craft center, the Vermont State Craft Center at Windsor. Located in the restored Windsor House, this center is open year round Mon.-Sat. 10-5 p.m.

Both centers are sales galleries for fine Vermont crafts and hold classes for children and adults, special craft festivals and rotating exhibits featuring Vermont craftspeople.

## Historic Places

**Addison** — Chimney Point, site of pre-1800 inn and Tavern, near northern terminus of Gen. Amherst's Military Road. Site of 1690 stockade, later chimney ruins of French fort, 1795, gave site its name. Tavern and Museum open late May-mid Oct. State owned. Open Wed.-Sun.

**Addison** — John Strong DAR Mansion, Rte. 117, 1795 historic house furnished in period, collection of china, glass and silver. May 15-Oct. 15-10:5 p.m., closed Tues. Adm.

**Bennington** — The Bennington Bell Monument, Vt. 9, in village. 306 ft. stone monolith built in 1891 to commemorate attack by American troops on British against General Burgoyne's troops during Revolutionary War. The battle took place on August 16, 1777. Open daily, April 1-Oct. 31. Adm. State owned.

**Burlington** — General Ethan Allen Burial Place, Colchester Avenue, Cemetery and marble statue. Battery Park, in city. Scene of abortive British naval attack on American fortifications, August 3, 1813.

**East Hubbardton** — The Hubbardton Battlefield and Museum, 7 miles off U.S. 4. Visitor's Reception Center and Museum. Site of Revolutionary battle, July 7, 1777. Open late May-mid Oct. State owned. Daily except Mon. & Tues.

**Fairfield** — President Chester A. Arthur Birthplace, off Vt. 30, May 10-108. Reproduction of original house, 35-acre park. Open mid June to Sept. Daily except Mon. & Tues.

**Grand Isle** — The Hyde Log Cabin, U.S. 2, Built in 1783. Oldest log cabin in U.S. Open July 4-Labor Day, daily, 10:30-5. Donations.

**Ile La Motte** — Shrine of St. Anne, on West Shore Rd. Roman Catholic shrine on site of Vermont's first white settlement. Fort Site. Ann. built in 1868.

**Manchester** — Historic Hildene, Home of Robert Todd Lincoln. May 24-Oct. 29, daily except Mon. 10-4 p.m. Adm.

**Middlebury** — University of Vermont, Morgan Horse Farm, Tours & audio/visual presentation. Daily May-Nov. 8-4 p.m. Adm.

**Montpelier** — State House, on State Street. Present structure dedicated 1859. Doric exterior. Corinthian interior. 14 carat gold leaf dome. Open year round: Mon.-Fri., 8-4 p.m. Closed holidays. State owned.

**North Bennington** — Park-McCollough House, 400 W. Main St., 1830. Reproduction of original house, 35-acre park. Open mid June to Sept. Daily except Mon. & Tues.

**North Ferrisburg** — Historic North Ferrisburg, 14 carat gold leaf dome. Open year round: Mon.-Fri., 8-4 p.m. Closed holidays. State owned.

**Phylomouth Notch** — President Coolidge Homestead. Several buildings including homestead, birthplace, church, store. Visitors center with museum. Open late May-mid Oct., daily. Adm. State owned.

**Reading** — "Indian Stones." Slate markers erected in 1798 to commemorate birth of Elizabeth Johnson, born where her parents were captives of Abnaki Indians. Located near northeast corner of intersection of Vt. Rte. 108 & Knapp Brook.
